
- Funded by the National Resilience Disaster Competition (HUD CDBG-DR)

- Prioritizing engagement and resiliency of socially vulnerable populations



Overview


- Identify and address gaps in flood resiliency planning within selected regions;
- Reach underserved populations; ensure representation and participation from socially vulnerable populations, and address their needs and risks;
- Develop innovative and implementable solutions that increase flood resilience in both the short- and long-term;
- Implement or advance prioritized actions that will reduce the risk of flood-related hazards to the region;
- Enhance the value and integrity of the ecological, recreational, and economic resources in the regions;
- Ensure collaboration among a wide variety of stakeholders.

Project Timeline




Program Structure

- Regional Teams

Eligibility

- 9 MID counties
- Teams must include at least 4 members:
 - At least 3 contiguous municipalities
 - At least 1 community-based organization (CBO) that represents underrepresented or socially vulnerable population(s).
 - One entity listed as the Prime, who is eligible to receive and distribute grants from the state.



Each Team must identify 1 lead entity that will:

- Coordinate regional team members for all meetings and activities
- Manage grant reporting and distribution of funds

Prime can be any entity that is eligible to participate in the program

Municipality, county, CBO, regional organization, utility authority



What's Involved for Team Members

Phase 1

- Attend and actively participate in project meetings and contribute to the development of the action plans.
- A minimum of two hours a month for meetings for the duration of the program, (through Phases 1 & 2)
- Participate in:
 - Community outreach
 - Asset identification & risk assessment
 - Resiliency scenarios
 - Plan creation

What's involved for Team Members

Phase 2

- Implementation of actions prioritized in Phase 1
 - Can be a single initiative or several small activities
- The Consultant Teams are responsible for executing the activities
- The Regional Teams are responsible for continued attendance and engagement with all activities such as community outreach
- Will begin in late 2020; must be finished by May 31, 2022



What can the funds be used for?

• To reimburse staff time and expenses (fringe, travel, indirect, supplies), up to the awarded amount

NOTE: Any town that wishes to reimburse a consultant for their time must procure that firm or individual under a process specific to their participation in Resilient NJ and compliant with HUD procurement regulations. If they participate, but are not separately procured, they can be considered in-kind services in the project budget.



What types of actions can be implemented in Phase 2?

- Phase 2 will fund projects identified and prioritized in Phase 1 as outlined in the Action Plan
- Projects must comply with HUD requirements for "Planning-Only Activities" such as data gathering, studies, analysis, and preparation of plans or advance analysis for long-range planning and solutions.
- The funds cannot be used for creating engineering or architectural drawings in support of construction.



Application Requirements

Proposal Narrative

- Describe flood risk/history
- Detail previous planning/regional initiatives
- Identify socially vulnerable populations
- Describe the region in terms of unique assets, unique challenges for resiliency, or other unique characteristics
 - Will be used to help in matching Consultant Teams

Application Requirements

- Duplication of Benefits Affidavit
 - Detail previous resiliency grants
- Letters of Commitment
 - From each team member
- Budget Proposal
 - Will not affect scoring; will be used in award determination



Application Criteria

Applications will be scored and ranked based on the criteria below. The maximum score is 100 points.

- Demonstration of Need (40)
 - Provide detailed description of vulnerable populations & impact of past disasters
 - Highlight areas that qualify as Low or Moderate Income
- Demonstration of capacity (40)
 - Do you have the ability to get the job done?
 - **Regional Description (10)**
 - What makes your region unique?

- Resolutions from governing bodies
- Grant Audit Report
- Cost Rate sheet
- Adopted Citizen Participation Plan
- Executed MOA or other legal document allowing the Prime to distribute grant funds to team members
